The Last Supper

In our culture, meals are important. Not only are they occasions for food, but they provide families with opportunities for being together, for conversation, discussion, sharing stories, recounting the day's events, proposing ideas for future activities. Special occasions provide times to include special guests in this sharing. The Last Supper was such an occasion for Jesus, Mary and his special friends. We have an opportunity to join this meal each year during Holy Week.

Institution of the Eucharist

At the Last Supper, Jesus instituted the Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist. It is when the apostles and special friends received their First Holy Communion. The Eucharist is when bread and wine is changed into the true body and blood of Jesus. Just as Jesus shed his body and blood for us on the cross, the consecrated bread and wine shows us the same humility and real presence. Our participation in the Holy Eucharist is the most significant way we acknowledge the resurrected Jesus. We celebrate its institution at the Holy Thursday Mass.

He made them priests. At this Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday, the sacred oils used for upcoming Baptisms, Confirmations and Anointing of the Sick, priestly duties, are blessed.

This was a very controversial action at the time, and is now an example for us as to how we should treat others.
